weddings again this year and working on the many future events.


Also, our fundraising committee is continuing to work hard to restore Gordon Hall to its original condition to fulfill our mission of preserving Dexter's history. We have the historic Gordon Hall floor plans and are working on a goal for full restoration.



This is the seventh article from the large posters displayed at 2021 Gordon Hall Days. Each article highlights an aspect of the Dexter Area, Gordon Hall or the Dexter Family. Caryl Burke or Jan Weaver researched the different subjects and added relevant pictures. Nancy Van Blarkcum edited and reorganized the articles to fit into this format.

<u>Lost Treasures at Gordon Hall</u>

Judge Dexter completed construction of his new home here on the hill overlooking Dexter in 1843. He named it Gordon Hall, in honor of his mother, Catherine Gordon Dexter. In this house, he and Millicent raised their family, ran the farm, conducted the family business, and entertained their friends and neighbors; all the things a prominent family did. Dexter died here in 1863 and Millicent stayed on until her death in 1899. Many additions and modifications were made to the house and grounds over those busy years including the tower added in about 1875; most of them are now gone.



The HABS Drawings

The oldest drawings we have date from 1934, when architects for the Historic American Building Survey (HABS) produced detailed drawings of Gordon Hall. The HABS drawings are a precious archive and provide us with a roadmap to restoration. It is believed that these drawings show the building mostly as it existed in Judge Dexter's time.

The Floor Plan

Major structural alteration of the interior by the University of Michigan (UM) in 1950 transformed Gordon Hall into four modern apartments; two on each floor. A few of the original features can still be seen when you tour the building.

The Ell

The northwest wing of the house was the service wing, with the kitchen and servants' quarters. It was razed when the University of Michigan (UM) renovated Gordon Hall in 1950. Today, the new bathrooms occupy the area where the original kitchen stood.


The Stone Privy

Before indoor plumbing, outhouses were built over a hole in the ground to provide privacy and to contain the smell. Often made of wood, they were moved when 'full', backfilling the hole with dirt.

In 1865, 2 years after Judge Dexter's death, Millicent Dexter built an elegant stone privy south of the house. One side was for the ladies and the other was for the gents. Some seats were for adults and some were for children. Rather than try to move it when full, they would have hired someone to come and clean it out periodically - a gong farmer or honey-dipper. The privy was demolished in about 1950.




NORTH ELEVATION
