

Welcome to another Michigan winter!


We had a very successful “Christmas At The Mansion” event and are already planning for future events like our famous raffle during Dexter Daze and Gordon Hall Days in September.

We began our end-of-year fundraising toward the rehabilitation of Gordon Hall with a bang this year. In October, a small group of generous donors pledged to match up to \$20,500 in donations made through the end of January 2022. With an overall goal of \$50,000, we set out to make sure everyone knew about this great opportunity. Even though it was a larger goal than we have attempted in past years, we knew our community would come through. And did they ever!! As of January 31, 2022, we have raised a total of **\$67,013!** This is a wonderful confirmation of how much this community loves Gordon Hall and supports our plan to restore it.

The restoration project itself moves forward a little every year. In 2021, we were thrilled to discover that the original flooring on the ground floor of Gordon Hall still existed under the

multiple layers of subfloor, tile, padding, and carpet that had been installed over the years by the U of M. With the help of our wonderful volunteers, all of those layers were removed in both ground floor parlors. The floor underneath was repaired where needed and lightly refinished, and now shines warmly in the north parlor. The south parlor is still in progress but will be completed soon. Look for the marks in this flooring that show where the walls, doorways, and cupboards originally stood when Gordon Hall was built!



Our plan in 2022 is to complete Phase 1 - installation of a geothermal heating and cooling system, which will be supported by this year's Challenge Grant funds. In this phase, an underground system of ground loops will be installed and connected to one geothermal heating unit in Gordon Hall's basement. This will be sufficient to heat and cool the northwest wing with some extra capacity. The heating and cooling for the rest of the building will come when the full rehabilitation of Gordon Hall is completed and the remaining geothermal units and ductwork are installed.

We are still targeting 2024, the year of Dexter's Bicentennial, for the full restoration of Gordon Hall. We are completing every project we can along the way to get us to that goal, but our biggest challenge now is fundraising. The next 2 years will be critical. Early Inhabitants

For many centuries this area was populated by Indian tribes, mostly of the Algonquin and Iroquoian language groups. The Algonquins included the Potawatomi, Ottawa, Ojibway also known as the Chippewa, Miami, and Sauk. The Iroquoians included the Hurons also known as Wyandots, Fox, Mohawk, Oneida, Onondaga, Cayuga, and Seneca.

European explorers arrived in the early 1600's followed by missionaries and fur traders who were mostly French. The English controlled the area after the French and Indian War and then the Americans gained control after the American Revolution. But the native settlements here did not change substantially until the area was opened up for settlement in the 1820s. As settlers moved in, many of the native peoples moved West or North to Canada.

Many of our place names came from the language of these tribes.


- **Michigan comes from the Ottawa "Mishigami" meaning large water or great water**
- **Washtenaw comes from the Ojibwe word Wash-ten-ong meaning "far off in the interior",**
- **Saginaw comes from the Chippewa word Sak-e-nong meaning "place of the Sauks"**
- **Many cities, towns, counties and townships are named for Native Chiefs - Tecumseh, Pontiac, Ogemaw, Sanilac**
- **Can you name some others?**

These native people were the first surveyors of the area, and many of the roads that traverse lower Michigan were originally Indian trails. The early settlers used these trails to travel west from Detroit and many became parts of the roads we still use today.

The Sauk Trail was used as a military road between Detroit and Chicago and eventually became parts of U.S. 12.

North Territorial was built from the Plymouth Trail to the east and the Dexter and Grand River Trail to the west.


INDIANS OF WASHTENAW COUNTY
